Ballots have been mailed to eligible voters in Hamilton, Kingston, Gomer, and New York Townships for a 3-year term on the County Committee. The two candidates are **Christopher (Chris) Cornelius** and **Walter (Dean) Snyder**.

Christopher (Chris) Cornelius has been farming for 35 years on his family farm and about 20 years on his own operation. He raises corn, soybeans, wheat and hay and is involved in the family dairy operation. Chris also builds his own terraces, and other conservation practices. He is a member of the First Christian Church of Gallatin and the Caldwell County Farm Bureau.

Walter Dean (Dean) Snyder has been farming for 45 years. He and his wife, Nancy, raise corn, soybeans, wheat, hay, and livestock. Dean also utilizes cover crops in his farming operation. He is actively involved in his community serving on the MFA Advisory Board, Lions Club member, Hamilton Fire Protection District Board President, Treasurer of Kendall Chapel Church, Kingston Township Trustee, Caldwell County Mutual Insurance Company Board Director, MFA Oil Delegate, Caldwell County Farm Bureau member, and I-35 Cattlemen's Association member.

Both candidates are willing to serve on the Caldwell County FSA committee, if elected. The deadline to return ballots to the FSA office, or to be post-marked, is Dec. 7, 2020. Please contact the office if you are an eligible voter and you did not receive a ballot. Ballots will be opened on December 10th.

The deadline to report 2021-

crop wheat is December 15, 2020.

Many FSA programs and payments require a complete and timely report of all crop acres on all farms. Please give us a call if you sowed wheat this fall so we can help you get your report filed timely. A late file fee and physical verification is required for planted wheat not reported by the deadline.

CFAP 2 enrollment began on September 21st and we have around 540 applications to date. If you have not applied yet, you only have until December 11, 2020 to file an application. It is an easy process and all you have to do is give us a call or stop by the office.

We are glad fall harvest is complete for most producers and we hope it went smoothly for you. If you have stored grain you want to put under CCC loan, please give our office a call. 2020-crop loan rates are:

Corn \$2.16/bushel

Soybeans \$6.15/bushel

Annual program signup for 2021 has begun and producers have the opportunity to change their elections in the ACR/PLC program. This program signup closes March 15, 2021.

Finally, a CRP general signup has been announced and will begin on January 4 and will end on February 12, 2021. This is a shorter period than the signup we had last year. We are going to begin the process of setting up appointments for producers interested in this signup. Please give us a call to set up an appointment, if you are interested.

The office will be closed on Thanksgiving day, but the office will be staffed on the day after. Our office wishes you and your family a wonderful Thanksgiving. Please let us know if you have any questions.

City of Hamilton wants to pave street but lacks enough funding

The Hamilton Board of Aldermen held their monthly meeting on Nov. 18. Those present were Aldermen Keith Gilbert, Cameron Fast, and Misty Doan. Alderman Danny Alexander was absent. Also present were Mayor Kris Bruce, City Administrator Jean Van Iperen, and City Attorney Blair Merri-gan.

During public participation, Presiding Commissioner Bud Motsinger reported that the county is getting ready for the third round of CARES money to be disbursed. Applications are due through the end of the year and decisions on disbursements will be made on Jan. 15. Funds would be distributed by March 1, 2021.

A summary was given of the city's audit report, which was described as a clean audit. No unauthorized transactions were reported, all inter fund transactions and balances reconciled out, and there were no difficulties with management in performing the audit or drafting up the financial statement. The loan principle did go down \$284,000, resulting in an ending balance of almost \$1.9 million.

Jean Van Iperen gave the police report. In the month of October, there were 441 calls for service, eight warrant arrests, 12 criminal investigations, 84 traffic stops, and 37 traffic citations. Officers completed 30 police reports, responded to five medical calls, three animal calls, and testified in numerous court appearances. The new patrol car has been delivered and the radio equipment was installed yesterday. Decals have been ordered.

Van Iperen gave the public works report. Aside from their

normal duties, the crew mowed the cemetery road on Harris St., raised a couple of man-holes and located several others, weed eaten and trimmed several trees, did some clean up at the creek bed, filled several potholes, ran the street sweeper, greased the road grader and backhoe, and installed a new stop sign at W. Ardinger and Bird streets. Wayne Hon has been working with Great Plains locating lines for the water project. A base was put down on W. Harris and an asphalt mix was placed in front of the post office. Furnace filters were replaced in city buildings, a toilet at the PD was repaired, and smoke testing was done on a sewer line at Frame and W. Arthur streets. The Christmas lights are ready and will be put up Monday and Tuesday.

People Services performed daily operations, monitoring and took monthly samples, collected bids on the finished water meter at the water treatment plant. The chlorine room at the plant is due for its annual maintenance scheduled for this month, which includes replacing gas feed injection tubing and rebuilding the 150 lb. cylinder gas regulators and injectors. The air dryer at the water plant for the pneumatic valve controls malfunctioned and was repaired. An aerator at the NE lagoon was rebuilt and returned. Another motor was sent out for repair. E-coli testing was done at the NE lagoon. The lagoons

The board approved filing dates of Dec. 15, 2020 to Jan. 19, 2021 to elect two board members for three-year terms.

Jaclyn Ford, Jesse Green and Will Railsback volunteered to serve on the John Belcher Scholarship Committee.

The board approved Bond Issue 2022 Schedule of Activities or timeline for construction of the new proposed building if the bond issue passes. Ford said that nothing will be set in stone until a year from now in November 2021 when the district will finalize the project, description, and amount.

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Cranberry Fluff

Ingredients

- 1 (10 ounce) bag fresh cranberries
- 1 (10 ounce) bag mini marshmallows

Same Day Version:

Add grapes to the cranberry mixture and mix. Blend whipping cream and sugar until stiff peaks form and fold into cranberry mixture, until everything is well coated.
Chill for several hours until ready to serve. Mix before serving!

Scuttlebutt

Welcome to the Scuttlebutt. We strive to provide information to local veterans and share a little bit about life in the military.

Last week, we were reviewing the series of skirmishes that occurred thru the 1980s, (a time of supposedly peace.) This week, we will move into the 1990s. We start off with the Persian Gulf War. (Desert Storm) The causes of the Gulf War actually started in 1980 when Iraq was at war with Iran. The US supported Iraq against Iran as a result of the Iran Hostage incident in early 1980. During this war Iran was not only attacking Iraq but also attacking oil tankers from Kuwait at sea too.

To support the ending of the war Kuwait financially aided Iraq by lending the country 14 Billion US Dollars. A series of disputes then occurred between Kuwait and Iraq and finally, Saddam Hussein decided that he had no other option but military, so he stationed 100,000 troops on the border and in early August invaded Kuwait. Saddam Hussein, ordered the invasion and occupation of Kuwait with the apparent aim of acquiring that nation’s large oil reserves, canceling a large debt Iraq owed Kuwait, and expanding Iraqi power in the region.

On Aug. 3, the United Nations Security Council called for Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait, and on Aug. 6, the council imposed a worldwide ban on trade with Iraq. The Iraqi government responded by formally annexing Kuwait on Aug. 8. Iraq’s invasion and the potential threat it then posed to Saudi Arabia, the world’s largest oil producer and exporter, prompted the United States and its western European NATO allies to rush troops to Saudi Arabia to deter a possible attack. Egypt and several other Arab nations joined the anti-Iraq coalition and contributed forces to the military buildup, known as Operation Desert Shield.

Iraq meanwhile built up its occupying army in Kuwait to about 300,000 troops. By November Iraq was still in control of Kuwait so the UN drew up Resolution 678 in which Iraq had until midnight on Jan. 15, 1991 to leave, otherwise military intervention could be used. On 16th January, Iraqi forces were still in Kuwait and a coalition force made up of 34 countries headed by America took up the challenge and started Operation Desert Storm, which in turn ended up being the beginning of the Gulf War.

To force Iraq out of Kuwait, George Bush formed a

large and diverse international coalition and deployed over a half-million U.S. personnel to the Persian Gulf region as part of an allied force. The success of Operation Desert Storm set a new high-water mark for the military and underscored the principle of committing overwhelming force to clear and achieve objectives.

This doctrine was espoused by Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman Colin Powell. From start to finish, Desert Storm only lasted 43 days, from Jan. 17, to Feb. 28, 1991. In fact, the land campaign is infamously known as the “100-hour ground war” for obvious reasons -- that is about as long as it lasted.

In the nearly 30 years since Desert Storm, about 250,000 of the almost 700,000 involved in the Gulf War 1 theater have suffered from some version of the complex of symptoms now called “Gulf War Illness.”

Military Hero’s – Ret. Lt. Col. Tom Fluker, AM-COM G3 (Operations)

“I served in the 1st Cavalry Division, an armored division with many tanks and other vehicles. Once we were alerted for service in Desert Shield, we had a little over a month to get many tasks - including painting our tanks and other vehicles -- accomplished before loading everything on ships for Southwest Asia. Our tanks were green camouflage at the time, and we needed to paint them sand colored. We had some chemical-resistant, sand colored paint, but the expiration date had passed. We decided to use it anyway. We ran three battalions worth of tanks - about 54 in each battalion - through the paint booth. They sat and dried a couple of days in the Texas sun. But, when they dried, instead of being sand colored, they were rosy pink! One of our Sergeant Majors said, ‘I don’t mind dying for my country. But I’ll be damned if I will die in a pink tank.’ We had to repaint all those tanks.”

On the Light Side- “Top Secret”

A famous Admiral and an equally famous General were fishing together when a sudden storm hit. When it died down both renowned warriors were struggling helplessly in the water. The Admiral floundered his way back to the boat and pulled himself painfully in. Then he fished out the General, using an oar. In Shake-Up, Acting Sec Def Elevates Special Operations to Be ‘On Par’ with Service Branches

Acting Defense Secretary Christopher Miller announced Wednesday that U.S. Special Operations Command will now report directly to him, putting it on par with the service branches. The action follows Miller’s sudden announcement Tuesday that U.S. forces will draw down from about 4,500 to 2,500 in Afghanistan, and from about 3,000 to 2,500 in Iraq, by Jan. 15, five days before the inauguration of President-elect Joe Biden. He said that enhancing the status of Special Operations Command is in line with his three priorities: Bringing an end to the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq; carrying out the National Defense Strategy, which focuses on China and Russia; and accelerating efforts to combat transnational threats. In authorizing the change, Miller addressed a long-standing complaint of special operators since Special Operations Command was made one of the Combatant Commands in 1987.

Understanding Your VA Patient Billing Statements. www.va.gov Nov 9th

On April 6, VHA stopped printing and mailing monthly patient statements. VA

understands that COVID-19 has negatively affected some Veterans. As a result, VA will not charge interest or add administrative charges, and will halt collection actions on medical care debt until at least December 31, 2020. Monthly patient statements may resume in January 2021. The statements will include co-payments for medical care and prescriptions received since patient statements were suspended, in addition to unpaid co-payment charges prior to April 2020.

In November 2020, Veterans with a balance on their accounts will receive an information-only letter that will state that balance and will contain information on how to make a payment, if the Veterans choose to do so. Staff will also make calls to Veterans with balances greater than \$2,000. Veterans can make voluntary payments while statements are suspended. Veterans will need their account number to access their balance and other related information. You can get an account balance by:

- Calling 866-400-1238.
- Calling the facility revenue office at your local VA Medical Center.

Lincoln's proclamation made Thanksgiving official

The first Thanksgiving is often associated with the Pilgrims. Over two centuries later, President Lincoln was the first to make it official.

The official designation of 1863 is the most lasting of the nine proclamations for a day of thanks issued by Lincoln during his presidency.

The idea of a thanksgiving was nothing new. On Oct. 3, 1789, George Washington had issued a proclamation for a day of thanksgiving, scheduled for November 26 of that year. It had been celebrated on various days throughout the nation, as many states had their own designations.

"Thanksgiving had much of its actual origins in religious proclamations by bishops," said Dr. James Cornelius, the former Curator of the Lincoln Collection at the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum in Springfield. "Forms of thanksgiving had been celebrated throughout much of New England, and continued through colonial times."

The impetus for an official national day of Thanksgiving came from Sarah Josepha Hale, the 74-year-old editor of *Godey's Lady's Book*, a popular women's magazine. Hale had written to several previous presidents asking for such a holiday, to no avail.

On Sept. 28, 1863, she wrote Lincoln, urging him to declare "a day of our annual Thanksgiving made a National and fixed Union festival." Noting "an increasing interest felt in our land to have Thanksgiving held on the same day, in all the states...it now needs national recognition and authoritative fixation, only, to become permanently an American custom and institution."

Lincoln had actually made several Thanksgiving proclamations during his administration. On Nov. 28, 1861, he had ordered all government departments to shut down for a local day of thanksgiving, and he requested national days of humiliation, prayer, and fasting on multiple occasions. Lincoln also proclaimed thanksgiving for signal victories in the Union war effort in April 1862 and another remembrance on Aug. 6, 1863.

On Oct. 3, 1863, Lincoln heeded Hale's call. He issued his own proclamation, declaring the last Thursday in November as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise. In 1863, that date would have also been Nov. 26.

"It was not only the anniversary of Washington's proclamation, but it also fell on the same day of the week," said Cornelius. "There's a sense of history in Lincoln's effort."

The words were actually penned by Secretary of State William Seward, and the original draft was later sold to benefit Union soldiers. To be sure, the proclamation was certainly heavy with military reference. Passages such as "in the midst of a civil war of unequalled magnitude and severity" and "the advancing armies and navies of the Union" called to light the national tragedy of the war.

Still, 1863 had been productive for the North, with key victories at Gettysburg, Vicksburg, and elsewhere. "There was reason to celebrate the progress of the war," said Cornelius. "Those were important victories, and Lincoln wanted to remember them."

Scholars have long debated the extent of Lincoln's Christianity, but the 1863 proclamation makes repeated religious references. Phrases as the "watchful providence of Almighty God," "the gracious gifts of the Most High God," "our beneficent Father," and "the Almighty Hand" are sprinkled throughout the document.

"Lincoln saw the day as an appropriate time to give national gratitude for God's plan and goodness," said Dr. Cullom Davis, a nationally recognized Lincoln scholar from Springfield. "It was yet another reason to be thankful."

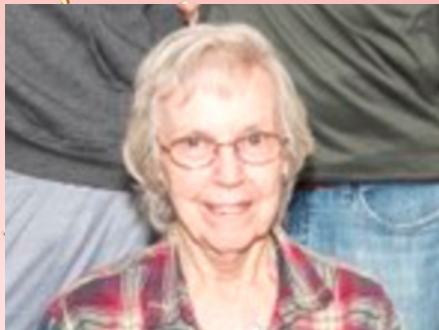
"To top it off, the year of 1863 brought a pretty good harvest," remarked Cornelius. "Lincoln saw plenty of reasons to celebrate, and they are all summarized in the Thanksgiving proclamation. References to historical tribute, the military, religion, and agriculture are all found in the document."

The first official Thanksgiving Day in 1863 would bring even more reason for the North to celebrate. On Nov. 25, the day before, Union troops earned an important victory at Chattanooga. The holiday was exactly a week after Lincoln delivered his Gettysburg Address.

Many also credit Lincoln as the first President to ceremoniously pardon a turkey, now an annual White House tradition. Lincoln pardoned the bird at the behest of his young son Tad in 1864.

have lower than normal flow due to less rainfall. The city is a couple of weeks into the water project. A change order was approved that will save the city \$22,000 to \$24,000. The money saved may have to be used to place a larger line at Willis St. The project is going rather smoothly. They are still waiting on their permit from MoDot to work in their right-of-way to run the line that feeds the town.

The filing dates for alderman and mayor’s positions is Dec. 15, 2020 thru Jan. 19, 2021.

The roof on the library was completed at a cost of around \$14,000.

The one-cent use tax on gasoline did not pass during the presidential election. The bill for it to appear on the ballot was \$2,835.19. When it ran with the municipal election the cost was \$1,900.

With the number of COVID cases rising the city has decided to limit community events in the library basement to once a week. This will leave enough time to have the room cleaned before the next event. The Police Chief will limit her appearance in group meetings in order to keep herself isolated. With the addition to the lobby, city hall will probably remain open to the public. The board discussed the possibility of constructing the same lobby entrance in the police department.

The mayor reported that several people in town had asked how they could get “children at play” signs placed in their yard. The signs need to be reflective and the cost comes out of the street budget. No decision was made on this issue.

The city has and will continue to use zoom during the city hall meetings so residents that can’t physically be at the meeting can have access through zoom.

The council discussed the cat ordinance. Not very many people in town have licensed their cats at city hall. Council was pretty much in agreement that cats running wild without a license would be euthanized if caught. The city can only hold an animal for 24 hours before they have to be boarded elsewhere. Residents will be responsible for a board bill and for the cost of euthanizing the animal.

The board discussed placing the one cent use tax on the sale of gasoline back on the ballot in the April election.

The board discussed adding an ordinance relating to fencing in town. Alderman Fast objected to this ordinance and described it as being too restrictive to citizen’s rights. Alderman Misty Doan brought up the point that a fence built out of unsightly materials not only affects the homeowner’s property but affects his neighbors’ property and affects the property value of a neighborhood. She believes that people should have the right to do as they desire, but they loose some of that when they move into a city and into a neighborhood. The city has an obligation to protect all citizens that live in a neighborhood and make sure that their property values stay where they should while at the same time respecting individual expression. Alderman Fast asked that the issue be tabled until aspects of the ordinance are negotiated and all board members are satisfied with the result.

The city passed an ordinance authorizing the city to enter into a contract for health, dental and life insurance for employees.

The city discussed the project cost of curb and gutter options for Gallatin Street from W. Berry to the city limits. A problem with the street is that many residents have to park on the street and adding curb and guttering without widening the street or adding parking areas would cause parking totally in the street making it one lane. At this point, the cost of curb and guttering and adding the parking areas is more than the city can afford. It was decided to bring in an engineer to discuss the project further.

The next city council meeting date was set for Dec. 9.

ed that he was at a superintendent’s meeting yesterday and they watched a live feed from the governor talking to the public concerning easing restrictions on mask usage in schools.

Ford said that the District’s policy was if high school kids are moving about a room and are less than 6’ in distancing, they have to wear a mask. Middle school has followed this example also. Ford also attended a meeting at the Health Department along with other superintendents from Caldwell County schools. The Health Department is willing to work with Hamilton schools. Ford said that until our elementary has had a major problem, he would prefer teachers focus on teaching and not worrying about kids wearing their masks continually. Elementary principle Billie Mc-

Graw agreed with Ford. She said she has had about 70 kids that have quarantined due to contract tracing from outside of the school. She worries more about the structural hours that have been lost due to those circumstances. Ford added that practices in the elementary school could change depending on how things turn out after Thanksgiving.

Principal Ross said he has had five positive cases in the middle school, 40 or more quarantined, none of the positives came from the school and nothing has ever been traced back to the school.

The board approved a snow removal bid from Dayrel Adkison for: 2-3” - \$1,200; 4-6” - \$1,600; 7” plus - \$2,200. Ford said if the amount is from 1-2”, he will make the decision whether it needs to be cleared.

Principal McGraw reported that there will be state testing this year as usual.

Superintendent Ford discussed the latest CARES Act money the district received. The money will be spent on substitute teachers, substitute bus drivers, and will be used to purchase more smart boards.

An alternative plan for the new building will be provided to the board soon.

Window tint will be placed in the elementary building sporting Penney’s logo to keep the sun out and to use as a protective barrier.

Ford said one of his biggest fears was not being able to staff the schools if COVID gets worse.

Presidential Turkey Pardon an annual tradition

Custom Began With Lincoln in 1863

Each year just before Thanksgiving, the President ceremoniously pardons a turkey, a light-hearted moment in his otherwise grueling schedule. The tradition is traced to Abraham Lincoln, who wrote a pardon at the behest of his youngest son, Tad, in 1863.

Though the origin is debated, many researchers believe that Lincoln was the first to bestow a Presidential pardon on a turkey, thus saving it from the dinner table. The reprieve, though, was actually issued at Christmas.

In late 1863, the Lincolns received a turkey as a gift, and though the bird was intended for Christmas dinner, nine-year-old Tad, an animal lover, had other ideas. He made a pet of the bird, which he named Jack, and taught the bird to follow him around the White House grounds.

On Christmas Eve, the President tried to tell his son that the bird would become the family dinner. Upset, Tad reportedly cried, “I can’t help it. He’s a good turkey, and I don’t want him killed.” Lincoln gave in and wrote out a pardon on a card, which he handed to his son to appease him.

“Tad was begging for the turkey’s life,” said Dr. Wayne Temple, an accomplished Lincoln scholar who recently retired as Deputy Director of the Illinois State Archives in Springfield. “Lincoln was always looking for something to amuse the children, so he pardoned the turkey.”

The President’s playfulness reflected other episodes with his children. In 1861, he had written a pardon for a soldier doll, also named Jack, that Tad and older brother Willie (who died the next February) had sentenced to death.

In 1997, Bill Clinton referenced Lincoln’s story in ceremonies to pardon a sixty-pounder named Willis. George W. Bush also made reference to Lincoln’s pardon in 2001.

“Lincoln is probably the only President with the sense of humor to pardon a turkey,” laughed Temple. “Other Presidents have been more serious-minded, but that’s how Lincoln could be.”

Some of Lincoln’s successors have shown less inclination. After President Obama’s first turkey pardon in 2009, one commentator found that the chief executive “did not seem all that thrilled with his role.” Seven

years before, when a female turkey – a thirty-pound gobbler named Katie – was pardoned for the first time, G. W. Bush absentmindedly twice called the bird “he.”

While many researchers credit Lincoln as the first President to issue a turkey pardon, others cite Harry S. Truman, who was the first to receive a gift bird from the National Turkey Federation in 1947. However, officials at the Truman Presidential Library in Missouri have found no evidence of any pardons given by Truman to a turkey.

His successor, Dwight D. Eisenhower, ate each of the birds given to him during his eight years in office. Four days before his assassination in 1963, John F. Kennedy offhandedly said of a 55-pound gift turkey, “we’ll let this one grow.”

The first President on record to deliver a pardon was Ronald Reagan in 1987, allegedly to draw attention from reporters’ questions on the Iran-Contra affair. No turkeys were spared the following year, but in 1989, Reagan’s successor, George H.W. Bush, instituted the pardon as an annual rite.

Two turkeys are normally chosen for the ceremony, one serving as an alternate, to stand in if the first bird cannot fulfill the duties. In 2008, Bush pardoned the backup, Pumpkin, after the top turkey, Pecan, came down sick the night before the ceremony.

In recent years, reprieved turkeys have been sent to various locations in Virginia, including George Washington’s estate at Mount Vernon and a place in Fairfax County called Frying Pan Park. From 2005-09, the turkeys were flown first-class to Disneyland to serve as grand marshals of Disney’s Thanksgiving Day Parade.

Today, the annual ceremony to pardon the turkey usually lasts a few minutes and provides a prime photo opportunity for the President and members of his family. The White House frequently invites children to join the ceremony, adding to the holiday festivities.
